

The Federal Lands Highway Program in Alaska. The Coffman Cove Road is a Forest Highway route running from the intersection with the North Prince of Wales (NPOW) Road through the Tongass National Forest to the City of Coffman Cove. The Coffman Cove route is 20.5 miles in length and is being fully reconstructed by Western Federal Lands (WFL) and the US Forest Service (USFS). The NPOW road has been reconstructed and paved by the WFL in the past. WFL has completed one segment with another currently under construction which will complete 17 miles of the route.

Forest Highway program dollars totaling approximately \$34,000,000 have funded the work, while USFS has completed a 3.3 mile segment utilizing \$6,200,000 of USFS funding. The Alaska Department of Transportation & Public Facilities



(ADOT&PF) has also constructed a 0.2 mile segment in the City of Coffman Cove that connects to a brand new ferry terminal funded and constructed by ADOT&PF. With the new terminal and improved road, recreational opportunities and visitor access will greatly benefit the local economy. The entire 20.5 mile Coffman Cove route will be paved in 2008 by WFL utilizing \$13,000,000 of Forest Highway dollars. This will complete the only paved route from the south end of the island and the cities of Craig, Klawock, and Hollis to Coffman Cove.
